



J.V. Meets Tucker



Action Is Specialty of Riggen; Sophomore Leads Springer Offense

One of the brighter spots on the Springer team this year has been the running of sophomore halfback Ben Riggen.

Ben's speed has been one of the main factors in the Springers' offensive attack. Although Ben stands only 5'7" and weighs only 140 pounds, he has repeatedly put nothing but wide open spaces between him and the defensive secondary. He has won the Best Offense jersey in every game this season except for the George Wythe game, in which he sustained an injury.

In the first six games this season, Ben has carried the ball 42 times for a total of 306 yards and an average of more than 7 yards per carry. He also had a kick-off return of 87 yards for a touchdown against Henrico. Ben as of the Henrico game has scored 24 points against our opposition.

Coach Hill feels that Ben is the fastest man ever to play football here at Highland Springs and he has the

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potential to become a real star. His fastest time in the hundred is 10.2 and Coach Hill thinks Ben has a good chance for making the All-Metro team.

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Offense Exhibits Improvement; H.S. Varsity Defeats Bull Dogs

In a homecoming game highlighted by pass interceptions and fine defensive plays, the Springer eleven fought to a hard earned seven to seven tie with the Varina Blue Devils, an old rival.

After a scoreless first half, the Springers took the second half kick-off, but were unable to score and had to punt. A fine punt by Steven Gates, who punted 5 times for a 37 yard average left Varina deep in their own territory. But then Varina work-horse Russell Hodges ran 91 yards on a broken play for the game's first score. The extra point kick was good and Varina led seven to nothing.

The Springer offense, which was unable to move in the third quarter, started a drive in the last quarter which led to its only score. This drive was sparked by the passing and running of Dennis Newcomb and the running of Ben Riggen and Wayne Warren. Newcomb scored the touchdown on a two yard run and Nicky Geer kicked the extra point that tied the game.

In the closing moments of the game, Varina moved the ball to the Springers 15 yard line; but a 15 yard penalty kept the Blue Devils from scoring.

The Springers were led on defense by Lewis Brooks, Ken Coffman, Eddie Parker, James Eacho, and Dennis Newcomb. The Highland Springs defense yielded 8 first downs and only 244 total yards.

The leading ground gainers for Highland Springs were Ben Riggen, who gained 56 yards in eleven carries, and Wayne Warren, who gained 51 yards in 12 carries. The Springers completed one pass for 25 yards, but had three intercepted.

The Springers carried a 1-2-1 record into the George Wythe game, hoping to emerge 2-2-1. This was the first time the Spiders had played the Bulldogs and they showed good form against them. Both the teams had won their opening game but then had had trouble getting started in the next few. The Springers showed a very tough defense by blanking the Bulldogs 14 to 0. The Springer defense has given up only 20 points since the Lane game in which they gave up 34.

The Springers also showed a much improved offense led by David Atkinson, Ben Riggen and Roland Breaux. Riggen raced 60 yards on the second play from scrimmage in the first period.

In the 3rd period, David Atkinson drove 23 yards for another Springer score. Nicky Geer converged after both touchdowns for the extra point which made the score 14 to 0. Roland Breaux, starting in his first game since his shoulder injury, played brillant football mixing his plays well and simply confusing the Wythe defense.

The offense and defense jerseys were awarded to Roland Breaux, David Atkinson, Dennis Story and Kenny Coffman, respectively.
