The Brogue, the literary magazine of Highland Springs High School, has received a new name, the Heather. Mrs. Frances Gibbs, who will serve as advisor of the Heather this year, reports that this is the beginning of an entirely new magazine, with the change in name representing a change in the book. Also, the new name ties directly in with the other school publications, the Highland Fling and Highlander, and the school name.

Since the magazine staff is not yet completed there will be opportunities for students, especially juniors, to obtain a position on the staff; however, two seniors, Mike Schwantke and Richard Wilcox have already been appointed to serve as editor-in-chief and literary editor, respectively.

Mike Schwantke, a member of the National Honor Society, as well as the Beta and Science Clubs, has had one year of experience on a publication, having worked on the Brogue this past school year. He also attended the Southern Interscholastic Press Association last year which he claimed was "a great place to be." Also, he remarked, "The classes, we hope, offered information in many departments that will help us put out a good magazine this time." Mike hopes to attend the Virginia Polytechnic Institute

after graduating from high school but has no definite plans yet following his college education. "With everybody's cooperation we should come up with a fresh, new magazine this year," he happily predicted.

Richard Wilcox, a Beta Club member, has also had a year of publication experience on the Brogue. Of the upcoming year of work on the "new" Heather, Richard commented, "We're very interested and optimistic about how we can improve the magazine." Richard hopes to attend either William and Mary or Randolph Macon College after high school where he will study law.

As in previous years, any student may submit to any member of the staff or to Mrs. Gibbs, poetry, prose, or art for consideration. As the Heather will have many more pages this year, there will be more of an opportunity for students' work to be published. By doing so, the purpose of the magazine, which is to encourage a high level of creative writing, will be accomplished.

Springers are strongly urged to support the Heather by financial contributions, as it has no other means of support and depends entirely on the number of student subscriptions.

Girls' and Boys' State Held

Students Study Government

Four excited Springers left Richmond on Sunday, June 19, to join 584 other Virginia girls on the campus of Radford College. Bonnie Luck, Betsy Pierce, Carolyn Tittle and Suzanne Varnier represented the Sandston-Highland Springs area at the 1966 session of Virginia Girls' State.

Sponsored by various organizations in their communities, Girls' States were given an opportunity to gain a first-hand knowledge of the importance of each citizen in a democratic government.

Distinguished Speakers

During the week, the girls were privileged to hear such distinguished speakers as Mrs. Eleanor P. Shepard of the Richmond City Council and Congressman William Jennings Bryan Dorn of South Carolina. Mrs. Shepard spoke on city government and finances, and Congressman Dorn gave an account of U.S. responsibilities in Vietnam. Also present were representatives of the armed services and state police force.

The first few days involved the study of city government. The girls, who were previously divided into twelve groups or cities, elected city officials and state senators. Bonnie was elected to the Monroe City council and Betsy was appointed Planning Board Commissioner, while Suzanne was given the title of dog catcher and Carolyn was elected to the state senate.

With city business completed, party conventions were held and candidates were nominated for state office.

Thursday was inauguration day. A formal ceremony was held as Governor Elect, Donna Blevins, of An-

dover, Virginia, took the oath of office. That night the girls were treated to special entertainment by the "Highwaymen."

Graduation exercises were held on Saturday, June 25.

Boys' State

Knowing little of what was to be faced in the upcoming week, Springer boys Ronnie Burrus, Charles Gayle, Dennis Nemcomb, Charles O'Connor, and John Saunders boarded a train in Richmond that would carry them to the College of William and Mary in Williamsburg, where they, along with other Virginia boys, would attend the annual Virginia Boys' State. After arriving on the campus, the more than six hundred boys were divided into twelve cities.

Upward People

Throughout the week of learning and experiencing the basics in running and sustaining a democratic government such as the United States, the boys had the opportunity to get acquainted with the campus on their own, while they also received a guided tour of Colonial Williamsburg. The sports program was competitive with each of the cities contending in swimming, baseball, and volleyball.

The entertainment was highlighted by a division of "Sing Out, America," called "Sing Out, Williamsburg"; their performance consisted of songs reflecting an overwhelming spirit of patriotism which instilled such ideas as "upward people" in the minds of these young Americans.

Two Political Parties

All of the participating boys were divided into two parties, the Federalists and Nationalists. Charles Gayle and Dennis Newcomb were in the Nationalist party, while Ronnie Burrus, Charles O'Connor, and John Saunders were Federalists. Each of the parties held nominating conventions during which candidates for the offices of Governor, Lieutenant Governor, and Treasurer were nominated. (Both Charles O'Connor and John Saunders served on the Federalist City Delegation for the Convention.)

Following the conventions, campaigns, and elections, the governor elect was sworn in at an inauguration ceremony held at the auditorium after a "victory" parade. Distinguished guest speakers for the occasion included Governor Mills E. Godwin, George Passage (a newspaperman from Norfolk), and Congressman Dorn of South Carolina.

Mrs. Bishop Retired; Career Not Regretted

As all good things must eventually come to an end so must Mrs. Virginia Bishop's teaching career. One of Highland Springs High School's most dedicated teachers, Mrs. Bishop has decided to retire this year after twenty-six years of service to the teaching profession.

Mrs. Bishop attended Mary Washington College and graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree. Returning to her home in Tazewell County, she began her teaching career in English and history. She later spent the great-

est part of her teaching career in Henry County and Fredericksburg. For the past ten years Mrs. Bishop has taught at Highland Springs.

No one particular thing was influential in Mrs. Bishop's decision to teach. She stated that she just knew that this was what she wanted; therefore, she prepared for it while in college.

Mrs. Bishop, who has always had a great love for teaching and working with the students, has noticed a big change in the average pupil throughout the years. She feels that when she first began teaching the students were more serious about their work, but now the students are much more interested in grades than in knowledge due to the pressures from home and from colleges. Before college boards there were no great pressures and less of a struggle for an education.

Mrs. Bishop feels that the average student had a much better chance several years ago because all students were being educated and "not just the top five." She, however, stated that she herself preferred teaching the average child over the college preparatory student.

Having thoroughly enjoyed teaching, Mrs. Bishop has no regrets. A wonderful person as well as a fine and dedicated teacher, Mrs. Bishop, whom Highland Springs must now lose, had only one closing remark, "I will always continue to be interested in the students and Highland Springs High School."

Edwards, Nicholson Study at TJ

Course Is Considered Hard

Summer vacation came late this year for two Springers. Dee Nicholson and Pat Edwards attended full day summer school classes until July 29th.

Dee and Pat participated in a National Science Foundation and Virginia Polytechnic Institute sponsored program held at Thomas Jefferson High School.

The course consisted of classes in three subjects.

During the morning session there were two 75 minute classes, one in matrix algebra taught by Dr. Svend T. Gormsen from V.P.I., and one in statistics and probability taught by Dr. R. Lowell Wine of Hollins College.

In the afternoon for the first two weeks there was a one hour course taught by Dr. Jonson of V.P.I. in the use of a computer. The rest of the afternoon was used as a study hall.

After the first two weeks the entire afternoon consisted of a study hall. This, however, did not mean that the computer part of the course was over. The students were given problems to

be done using the computer. Those participating in this program were allowed to run their programs on an IBM 1410 computer in the Blue Cross-Blue Shield building on West Broad Street.

Each pupil was required to write a 3-10 page term paper on any mathematical field. There were also three-hour exams in each of the subjects.

The students felt that the course was hard but they still found some time for fun.

One of the scholars' most frequent complaints was that the computer couldn't read their minds and that it did what they told it to do instead of what they wanted it to do. Another complaint was that Dr. Wine kept saying that things were "obvious" when they certainly weren't obvious to the students.

Dee spent her remaining month of vacation "recovering," while Pat visited relatives in Iowa setting aside the final week of vacation for recuperation before the reopening of school.

Clubs Seek Support Of All

The main goal of the Honor Council is to promote honesty and integrity among the students. It is composed of representatives from each homeroom and sponsors various projects throughout the year.

The F.T.A. is open to anyone with a good scholastic average and a true desire to become a teacher. Each year juniors and seniors are allowed to teach one day at any of the elementary schools in this area. They also earn money to send three members to the annual convention and to award two \$50 scholarships to deserving senior members.

The French Club is open to anyone who is taking or has taken French. Its objective is to help members learn more about the French culture, language, and people.

The Spanish Club, similar to the French Club, is for students who have had or are taking Spanish. It gives members a chance to extend their classroom skills and become more proficient in speaking the language.

The Christian Youth League is open to all students. Its purpose is to promote Christian activities within the school.

The Debate Club is open to anyone interested in debating. Its purpose is to stimulate an interest in thinking through and presenting both sides of an issue.

The Library Club is made up of students interested in books and reading. Members enjoy guest speakers, book reviews, and trips to different libraries.

The purpose of the Key Club is to develop leadership and prepare members for useful citizenship. Perspective members are nominated by the sponsors and the old members narrow this list down so that about ten new members are taken each year.

The Monogram Club consists of boys who have made varsity letters in either football, basketball, baseball, or track.

The F.H.A. is for girls who take home economics. Its purpose is to

promote community, home, and family life.

The Y-Teens, open to all girls, strives to promote spiritual, moral, and social growth. Triangle I is open to juniors and seniors while Triangle II is open only to sophomores.

The Audio-Visual Club is for students who work as aides in the library at least one period a day. It functions as a service organization to the school.

The Hi-Y is for boys with good scholastic standing and good character who are willing to give voluntary service to the school. Its purpose is to extend high standards of Christian living throughout the home and school.
